City council met in regular session at the city hall with the following members present: Mayor Frank M. Dickinson, Alderman J. T. Woods, Jr., Alderman Tom B. David, Alderman John A. Lewis. Alderman A. J. King was still absent due to illness but was reported on the improved list.

Mr. Beverly Langford was present at the meeting and opened the meeting with prayer.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read by the clerk and approved by the council.

Mr. Wade Brown who lives on the East side of Victory Drive outside the city limits of the City of Calhoun was present at the meeting and requested the city council to take his property into the city limits of the City of Calhoun. After discussion the council informed Mr. Brown it would be necessary for him to use city power before his property could be taken into the city. Mr. Brown stated he would consider the matter further and let the council know of his action at a future date.

Mr. Neal Sutherland and Mr. Kenneth Taylor of the Veteran's Cab Company appeared before the council regarding the number of school children being hauled at each load. Mr. Taylor stated he hauled 111 children in his cab and had no trouble seating them. After discussion the council decided to let the drivers of the cab's look after the safety of the children since there seemed to be no state or city law stating the number of children that could be hauled in a car for hire.

The council discussed running a water line to the community where the Glasrock Products, Inc. plant is now located. City Supt. James Owens reported the distance was just too great for the number of customers willing to take city water.

Council instructed City Supt. James Owens to paint yellow lines across the street's of Piedmont and South Wall at the intersection of said streets. This being necessary to stop traffic at the proper distance from the red light at the intersection.

Alderman Tom David made a motion that the City of Calhoun pay one half the cost of \$390.00 or the sum of \$195.00 for replacing the curb in front of the new courthouse on Wall Street. Alderman Woods seconded the motion and Mayor Dickinson called for a vote. Alderman Woods and Alderman David voted for the motion and Alderman Lewis voted against. Mr. Lewis gave his reason for voting against the motion as double taxation on the residents of the city since the county had levied a tax for the courthouse and all city and county residents were required to pay this tax.

Mayor Dickinson reported the City School Board had invited the City Council to a meeting on Monday April 30, 1962 to go over the city school budget for the coming year.

The council instructed the city supt. to inspect all alley's and make sure they were well lighted.

Supt. James Owens stated to the council it would take approximately \$174.72 to repair the sidewalk at the home of H. J. Combs on North Wall Street. The council decided the city would repair the sidewalk if Mr. Combs would pay the cost. This being agreed on since the sidewalk was in good shape before Mr. Combs removed the trees in his yard causing damage to the sidewalk.

There being no other business the meeting was adjourned.
